From The Children's Room

We are busy preparing for the 2010 Summer Reading Program: Go Green @ Your Library. This summer's programming will have an environmental focus including: Felix Neck Sanctuary, Polly Hill Arboretum, and Gus Ben David's *Animal Interviews*. July and August storytimes will feature eco themes such as trees, ocean, gardens, and bees. We will use recycled materials in our craft projects. Our 2010 Summer Reading Program has three levels: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. Each level is achieved by reading 3 hours (or 12 picture books for young children). Picture books can be read to a child or baby as well.

Sharkey's Cantina has generously donated 250 green lanyards with the library's name on them, one for each child who reaches the first level in the summer reading program. The Black Dog KIDS once again agreed to donate money to the World Wildlife Fund when our combined reading hours total 900. The donation will be used to adopt an endangered sea turtle as part of our charity-based program. Last year we adopted a polar bear.

Tech IT Out: Technology Blooms @ OBPL

On Saturday, March 20, a crowd of 60 people attended the library's 2nd Annual Technology Fair. Community, school, library, and business leaders presented new information and communication technologies to the public.

Many people came to learn about electronic books and reading devices such as the Amazon Kindle. Others attended to see kids from the Oak Bluffs School demonstrate animation software and web design projects. Community nonprofits came to be educated about a new electronic information privacy law. One attendee wrote to The MV Times, "The fair was a wonderful learning opportunity that provided some very useful business information and resources."

As technology becomes more a part of our daily lives the library is becoming an important community resource for learning about the latest electronics and technology trends. Computer classes, online language learning, downloadable audiobooks and music, and other popular programs and services are being offered at your library.

Off-Season Update: A Blizzard Of News & Events!

Whether metal detecting in surf and sand, connecting with fossils, learning about winter gardening or listening to poets and authors discuss their works, the off-season was a busy season at your library. A series of computer classes were very popular, requiring a waiting list for all 6 classes. Also of note, new book clubs for children and teens were launched this winter and they continue to grow in popularity.






