3 Stars Awarded to the OBPL in National Rankings



Library Journal's Index of Public Library Service 2009 was recently released and the Oak Bluffs Public Library was one of only 258 public libraries in the country to receive a star rating.

The study rated 7,268 public libraries based upon per capita statistics in the following categories: circulation of ma-

From the Children's Room

This fall has brought expansion of the juvenile and teen collections as well as new programming. Toddler and preschool storytimes continue on Wednesday mornings with thematic books, music, movement, and art projects. We also started our Bilingual Storytime (Portuguese-English) in November with a theme of autumn and leaves.

Three monthly book clubs are now being offered: a Children's Book Club (elementary school levels), Middle School Book Club, and Teen Book Club. Most books selected are nominees for the 2010 Massachusetts Children's Book Award.

In February, we will offer a new book club joining teen girls and their mothers. Books selected will appeal to both teens and women, and will facilitate mother-daughter discussion and bonding over books. The first book, *A Northern Light* by Jennifer Donnelly, won awards in both teen and adult categories. It is hoped that this new book club will grow and continue throughout the spring.

Free Computer Classes At Your Library

A series of free computer skills classes for beginners and intermediates will be offered at the library this winter. Space is limited for the classes, please speak to a library staff member to learn more and to reserve a seat. The series has been made possible in part by a generous donation from the Martha's Vineyard Savings Bank.



A series of computer classes were funded last winter by a federal grant, through the Library Services and Technology Act—Equal Access Program. These classes were so well received by the community that the library organized another series for this winter.

Richard Hammond, an employee at the Martha's Vineyard Regional High School, a continuing education instructor and the owner of Hammond & Associates, will be the instructor for the classes.

Library To Host 2nd Annual Technology Fair

The library plans to host its second annual technology fair during the month of March. At last year's fair, representatives from a variety of Island organizations created display tables and provided presentations about MAC and PC computers, Google Tools, Web Design & Home Networking, Telecommunications, Town Wi-Fi, downloadable audio books, and more.

Mat's Choice: *The Strain* by Guillermo del Toro - the first book in a modern day vampire-horror trilogy. A vampire virus threatens humanity. The suspense and modern twist on vampirism are riveting.

Colleen's Choice: Charles and Emma: the Darwins' leap of faith by Deborah Heiligman - an unintimidating introduction to the lives of Charles and Emma Darwin. The role his wife played in shaping his research was particularly interesting. Recommended for both adults and teens.

Rosemary's Choice: Biology of Belief: unleashing the power of consciousness, matter & miracles by Bruce Lipton, Ph.D - a very entertaining and readable science book, coupling biology with quantum physics.

Anita's Choice: *The Help* by Kathryn Stockett - one of the best books that I have ever read. Really enjoyed the characters and the relationships that developed between them.

Anna Marie's Choice: *The Women: a novel* by T.C. Boyle - an engrossing book about Frank Lloyd Wright, as told through the voices of the important women in his life. This is my pick of 2009.

Pam's Choice: Every Man Dies Alone by Hans Fallada - A real eye-opener for me, as I'd never realized that there was a whole segment of the war-time German population that was anti-Hitler. I was moved by the courage which these everyday Germans displayed in their small fight to speak up about the atrocities that were occurring.

The statistics were used to rate the service of public libraries in comparison to libraries of similar funding levels.

Eight members of the Cape & Islands Library Automated Materials network received star ratings, including the Vineyard Haven Public Library and Oak Bluffs Public Library which received a three star rating. The West Tisbury Free Public Library received a five star rating for their funding level.

The extensive amount of service provided to residents and seasonal visitors alike is one reason for the high rankings of local libraries. The national rankings emphasize the importance of public libraries to the Cape Cod and Island communities.
