SHE TOILS BEHIND THE SCENE

She is rarely seen by library patrons, but Rosemary Hildreth is an indispensable member of the Oak Bluffs Library staff. As

the administrative Assistant/Technical Service person she wears a lot of hats. First of all, Rosemary assists Library Director Sondra Murphy in many areas, handles the payroll, transfers money and, most important, decides on what books to buy for the library and what books to discard.



Rosemary's roots are planted firmly in Massachusetts. She grew up in Holliston and visited Martha's

Vineyard many times before she and her husband, Kenneth, bought a house here in 1987. Unhappily, he died of cancer in 1990 and she moved permanently to Oak Bluffs a year later. Today Rosemary lives quietly with her mother, Gertrude Knowlton, who is 101 and still going strong. "She reads all the time," says Rosemary.

She first worked at the library 20 years ago in 1993. "The part of my job I enjoy most is putting the book collection together,' says Rosemary. "I read every book review available and then make a decision on what books the library should buy. I read as much as I can at home, do some photography and birding and to bed early."

"I wouldn't be able to do my job without Rosemary," says Sondra Murphy. "Rosemary takes care of all the little details that no one else ever thinks about. Without her the library would fall apart. She's the backbone of the whole operation. We are very lucky to have her here." §

She is not only the President of the Library Friends of Oak Bluffs, but also runs the organization's Steering Committee, all the while holding down a fulltime job as Administrative Assistant for the Town of Oak Bluffs Building Department Board of Health and Zoning Board of Appeals.

For good measure, Colleen also is member of the Martha's Vineyard Regional High School advisory board, as well as an active member of the Martha's Vineyard NAACP, serving on several committees. For relaxation she plays a lot of duplicate bridge, reads biographies, is a member of an informal book club and walks Shadow, her nine-year-old beagle. Where Colleen gets her energy is a mystery.



Colleen was born in

Brussels, Belgium and grew up all over Europe and Washington DC as an army brat. She majored in German and French at Howard University, in German studies at Middlebury College and in German language studies at the University of Salzburg's Goethe Institute.

Colleen's work before moving permanently to Martha's Vineyard in 1998 has been equally varied. Her very first job was as a tour guide in the Renwick Gallery of the Smithsonian Institute, followed by a stint as an administrative assistant at the Washington National Cathedral. Later she worked as a paralegal with the Historic Trust for Historic Preservation. Finally, Colleen taught English and was the dean of students at the Kirov Academy for Ballet in Washington DC.

Colleen joined the LFOB in 2011 and became president last year. "I am very pleased that so many programs can be realized now with a new and vibrant library staff in place. I want them to succeed and benefit from all of our fund raising efforts."
