Slavery Remembered: A Record of Twentieth-Century Slave Narratives (Ecsott, Paul D.)

First major attempt to analyze the slave narratives gathered as part of the Federal Writers' Project. Sensitive examination and quantitative analysis of nearly 2,400 narratives, presenting the differing beliefs and experiences of masters and slaves.

The Amistad Rebellion: An Atlantic Odyssey of Slavery and Freedom (Rediker, Marcus)
Unique account of the most successful slave rebellion in American history. 2013 edition includes new epilogue about author's trip to Sierra Leone to search for Lomboko, the slave-trading factory where the Amistad Africans were incarcerated.

AFRICAN AMERICAN 973.7 TOBIN

Hidden in Plain View: A Secret Story of Quilts and the Underground Railroad (Tobin, Jacqueline L. & Dobard, Raymond G.)

Part adventure and part history, traces the origin of the Charleston Code from Africa to the Carolinas, revealing how enslaved men and women made encoded quilts and used them to navigate their escape on the Underground Railroad.
